



ICE STORM 2024



ascades Raptor Center had big plans for 2024: host an international bird training conference, renovate the Resident Care Building kitchen and restroom, become a USDA Class C-licensed bird exhibitor, finish our program arena, and start a new summer flight show. Accomplishing any one of these projects in one year would be something to celebrate. Accomplishing all four was going to take an extraordinary amount of effort, but we were ready for it!

Nature, however, tossed us a curveball before we even started. In the second week of January 2024, an ice storm warning was issued for our area. Initial forecasts predicted a moderate amount of freezing over a short period, nothing we felt we couldn't handle. We set about our usual preparations of testing generators, checking emergency supplies, and planning staff transport to the center.

On January 13, the freezing rain fell and the first ice layers began accumulating. We waited for things to clear up that night as predicted. However, the ice kept coming. By the next day, power was out and limbs were falling. We adjusted our plans and continued to wait. Navigating the site was difficult, but all humans and birds were safe. Residents and hospital patients continued to receive the care they needed. It would have to end soon, right?

No.

On January 15, our main electrical pole came down, leaving power lines strewn across our driveway and a major trail. Then as staff were making their morning rounds, an iced-over tree fell and crushed an aviary—with its Bald Eagle tenant, Atticus, still inside. Luckily, Atticus was unharmed

and we were able to quickly move him to safe housing. Everyone breathed a sigh of relief. Little did we know the worst was still to come.

Early on the morning of January 17, training staff arrived to find a devastating sight: another tree had come down and cut the adjacent aviary completely in two. The Great Horned Owl inside, Lorax, was nowhere to be seen. Our immediate thought was that she was trapped under the rubble injured, or worse, dead.

As staff started digging through the debris and calling her name, they heard a familiar "Eeep!" from up the hill. Lorax was calling to us from a tree! Once located, she

came down to us immediately when called. She then spent the rest of the day safe indoors in her travel crate, chatting happily to the relieved staff.

That week, things began to thaw. We knew cleanup would be very expensive, so we encouraged people to donate towards our storm recovery. As press coverage of our situation spread, community support began pouring in from all directions at a level we never expected. We received donations from as far away as the United Kingdom, many from first-time donors. Lorax's picture even ended up on the front page of the newspaper.

With the cost of repairs covered, we could focus on the slow process of returning our facility to functionality. In addition to massive amounts of storm debris, our site still had freezing temperatures, no power, no hot water, and the main kitchen under construction. Community work parties picked up broken brush all over the site. Many local arborists volunteered removing dangerous dangling tree limbs. Staff and volunteers ultimately hand-collected eight 30 cubic yard dumpsters of debris—enough to fill two average backyard swimming pools!

On February 8, just three weeks after the storm, we were able to safely reopen to the public. Every emergency event like this is a learning opportunity for us. We come out of



it more skilled in our preparation, more confident in our response, and now, more secure in our recovery, knowing the community near and far has our back.

HOSPITAL SPOTLIGHT

BALD EAGLE NEST COLLAPSE

Dedicated hospital staff use their training to successfully rehabilitate two eaglets from a terrible fall.







n a windy day in May, a Bald Eagle nest with two young eaglets collapsed. The two eaglets fell out of their pine tree to the ground, where the property owners found them stuck inside blackberry bushes, barely able to move. When our hospital team came to the rescue, they identified that each eaglet had a substantial fracture in their leg. One sibling had a fracture in their right leg and the other in their left leg. While we typically do not name our patients, knowing these two would be patients for some time, we nicknamed these siblings Righty and Lefty (as they coincidentally had a fracture in the opposite leg). The pair required intensive care in the beginning, as eaglets are heavy at this age and unable to stand. We had to constantly change splints and closely monitor whether the fractures were healing at the correct angle, as the babies were constantly moving and growing fast. Once the fractures felt stable, the eaglets were put out in a big flight aviary where they learned how to walk and fly. Righty and Lefty healed and grew beautifully. They stayed with us throughout the summer, a total of 124 days, before they were able to be released in the fall. These two eagles had big personalities, and the hard work done by hospital staff and volunteers made it extra rewarding to see them soar away together on a beautiful September afternoon.



HOT DAYS AND COOPER'S HAWKS

Huge thanks go out to our volunteer tree climbers.



n the sweltering month of July, during our busy summer season, Cascades Raptor Center admitted a total of twelve young Cooper's Hawks. Cooper's Hawks nest high up in trees, and when the weather grows unbearably hot, many nestlings jump from their nest due to overheating. The babies were admitted to the hospital, assessed, rehydrated, and treated for injuries. With the help of an amazing team of tree climbers, the hospital team was able to successfully re-nest the majority of the young Cooper's Hawks and reunite them with their families! It takes a lot of care and patience to find the nest and re-nest young birds without startling any other siblings in the nest. We are very fortunate to have a wonderful team of volunteer tree climbers up to the task!

SILVER BRIGADE



very facility, no matter how large or small, has a constant to-do list of maintenance needs and Cascades Raptor Center is no exception. We have a facilities manager on staff, but with eight acres and over 40 structures on site, taking care of our property is much more than a one-person job. This is when the Silver Brigade steps in.

The Silver Brigade is the self-assigned nickname for our facilities volunteer team, currently made up of six handy retired gentlemen aged 50-80. Since 2013, they have been spending five to ten hours a week helping us build, repair, or replace whatever is needed on site. This might be anything from a door hinge to a full-length fence. If you have ever visited our center, you've seen their handiwork all around.

The biggest project this team tackles? Our raptor enclosures! Many visitors don't realize these aviaries are our own custom design and are built entirely by our facilities volunteers. Through many years of experience, the Silver Brigade and our staff have developed an adaptable aviary model specifically designed around the birds' needs and the challenges of building on our steep terrain. When the IAATE conference came to our center in February (see page 16), several attendees said they wished they could take the Silver Brigade back to their own facilities.

Why do you volunteer with the Silver Brigade?

Aron: "I started right after the last ice storm. You could see the damage from the road. I thought my skill set as a builder could be helpful...I enjoy using my skill set for the benefit of the birds."

Mitch: "I volunteer because the work we do feels meaningful, is unique, and I appreciate the commitment and passion of everyone at Cascades. I feel that our work as the Silver Brigade is really appreciated and supports the staff and other volunteers in delivering the best care and environment possible for these amazing creatures."

Tim: "I think the work we do is important for Cascades Raptor Center. I like the people I work with and feel appreciated for the work I do. I also like the outdoor work and the sense of accomplishment about getting things done...I think it is important for people to volunteer and contribute to the community in which they live; this is an important contribution I can make to my community."

Jim and Jay: "I enjoy the people we work with, and how well everyone works together. And the pastries Ron brings in!"

Ron: "[I volunteer] because I feel like my work is valued by the staff, and every time I come here, I leave feeling that Cascades Raptor Center is a little better than when I arrived. I really enjoy building things, and the interactions with the staff and other volunteers is fantastic. This is the first place that I have worked with that I feel that everyone chooses to be here rather than working just for a paycheck. Everyone seems to enjoy what they do and values the environment."



Sheep Update

Last spring, we welcomed three young Gotland/Icelandic sheep to our site. We had never kept livestock on our property before, but with eight acres to manage and fire risk a growing concern, we needed a way to keep both invasive plant species and wildfire fuels in check.

Elm, Buttercup, and Icicle immediately became beloved members of our team. They quickly learned how to be led to pasture each morning and come home to their paddock at night. The rest of the day they spend feeding with gusto on weeds and shrubs. We like to say they are professional eaters!

Nearly two years onward, we are starting to see the real impacts of their work. Areas they grazed last season were littered this spring with native wildflowers. When they are rotated to a new area, songbirds immediately take over the old pasture to forage for newly exposed seeds and invertebrates.

Although not always visible from our public trails, the boys are out every day hard at work helping us take care of the land. If you're lucky, you might catch a glimpse of them through the trees on your visit.

RAPTOR ART EXHIBITIONS

Cascades Raptor Center Community Art Exhibition

Raptors of the Pacific Northwest



Through a new community outreach initiative, Cascades Raptor Center hosted its first Raptor Art Challenge and community art exhibition, highlighting Oregon artists and native raptor species. Putting out a call to artists just before the winter season settled in, the Center received over 85 art submissions from adult artists across the state. The Raptor Center staff was astounded by the talent and skill of the artists who submitted work, making it nearly an impossible selection process.

The community art exhibition was curated by Cascades Raptor Center's Engagement Designer, Melissa Green, who installed the artwork at Springfield's City Hall Gallery with support from the Springfield Arts Commission and a second exhibition at the Emerald Art Center.





Showcasing 60 works of art, Raptors of the Pacific Northwest featured Oregon artists and their portraits of birds of prey found in our local landscape. Highlighting owls, eagles, falcons, osprey, hawks, and vultures, each artwork provided a unique perspective capturing the artist's relationship to a raptor species. The pieces spanned mediums

from woodwork to cross stitch, gourd sculpture, felting, painting, textile, jewelry, and more.

The juried exhibition was on view from April through June 2024 and the gallery served as a celebration space for our new fundraiser, Flights of Fancy. Many artists shared a portion of the proceeds from their art sales through donations to raptor care and environmental education. We are very grateful for the generous support from participating artists and support from the creative community.

Cascades Raptor Center was honored to display the thoughtful raptor-inspired work and to listen to the reflective dialogue the collection evoked. The Raptor Art Challenge and art exhibition brought together a community of incredible artists in support of raptors and helped viewers foster deeper connections with these important species.



Youth Raptor Art Challenge

Building connections with local wildlife and invoking a sense of outdoor wonder, Cascades Raptor Center's first Youth Raptor Art Challenge provided an opportunity for students in grades 2–12 to create portraits of raptors found in the Oregon landscape.

Over 300 youth submitted artwork to the 2024 Art Challenge which highlighted Osprey and Turkey Vulture species. Many of the submissions came from participating classrooms who received free in-school visits from Cascades Raptor Center staff. The creative raptor portraits went on public display in the spring at the Cascades Raptor Center and at the Emerald Art Center for visitors to enjoy.

IAATE CONFERENCE 2024



f the many organizations Cascades Raptor Center has collaborated with, few have shaped our development more than the International Association of Avian Trainers and Educators (IAATE). Founded in 1992, IAATE is a professional organization devoted to fostering communication and cooperation among bird trainers working in environmental education. We have been members almost since its inception and its board

now includes two of our training staff (Kit Lacy, board president, and Sidney Campbell, general board member). Without the mentorship and support we have received through IAATE, we would not be the facility you see today.

Since IAATE has had such a meaningful impact on us, we decided it was time to give back. Through the dedicated efforts of Sidney, and over a year of planning, Cascades Raptor Center was nominated and selected as the host facility for the IAATE's 2024 annual conference. We were hopeful that we could pull

off an exciting, educating, and inspiring event for all attendees—and did we ever!

In February 2024, only one month after being hit by a devastating ice storm (see page 4), Cascades Raptor Center hosted more than 150 conference attendees from six different countries. Over the course of the three-day event, attendees participated in training workshops,

paper presentations, roundtables, a birding trip to Finley Wildlife Refuge, and plenty of time to network with fellow avian trainers and educators from across the globe.

One of the highlights of this conference is always Zoo Day, when the host facility sets aside a whole day to welcome attendees to their site and demonstrate how they work with birds. On a foggy Oregon morning, over

a hundred bird trainers clambered aboard a fleet of rented school buses and traveled up to our nature center. They witnessed our fledgling flight show, met our landscaping sheep, and toured around the site—especially the gift shop! The conference-goers knew of our recent natural disaster and decided to assist our recovery efforts by spending their dollars generously in our store.

When polled later, attendees agreed this was one of the best IAATE conferences they had ever attended. The bird training community is legendary for its camaraderie and

generosity, which was abundantly demonstrated through the friendships formed, conversations had, and well-wishes exchanged at the conference. We are incredibly proud to have been able to represent Eugene and Cascades Raptor Center at the event and will continue to carry on IAATE's tradition of helping each other learn, grow, and be inspired by our work.
