Falco sparverius

Wingspan 20-24"

Smallest and most widespread falcon in North America

Nasal Tubercles

Similar to jet engines, these help falcons optimize air flow during high speed diving

Malar Stripe

Vertical lines absorb solar glare, helping to hunt in bright conditions

Sexually Dichromatic

(uncommon in raptors) Vivid & contrasting plumage
