

# HOSPITAL INTAKE



t's been a record-setting year here at the Louise Shimmel Wildlife Hospital, with over 1,000 patients admitted, by far the largest number of intakes in our history!

Ever since our founding in 1990, we've been driven by the belief that caring for birds of prey and other wildlife is good for the environment, good for the community that we're part of, and good for the world. As Lane County's only licensed wildlife rehabilitator and Oregon's only raptor-specific facility, we've been putting that belief into action for 35 years now. Still, nothing could have prepared us for the staggering volume of patients that came our way in 2025.

We are grateful to have a collaborative and compassionate hospital team guiding the care of every animal we treat. New equipment, better systems, and deep trust among team members led not only to improved quality of care for our patients but also optimized efficiency, allowing us to keep up with the record number of intakes.

Despite the season's fast pace, our staff still found

time to share their expertise with the broader wildlife rehabilitation community. They hosted re-nesting workshops and classes for both the Oregon Wildlife Rehabilitators Association and the Michigan Wildlife Rehabilitators Association. Dr. Katie McInnis, Staff Veterinarian, presented at the 2025 Raptor Research Foundation Conference in Costa Rica, and Jesse Pline, Senior Rehabilitation Technician, is preparing to speak at the 2026 National Wildlife Rehabilitators Association Symposium in Louisiana.

# **Caring for All Wildlife**

Although raptors are our specialty, they make up only about 20 percent of the animals that arrive at our hospital. Under the guidance of Dr. Katie McInnis, our team provides triage and stabilization for a wide variety of species from Lane County and beyond. Songbirds and small mammals remain with us for up to 48 hours before being transferred to our friends at Chintimini Wildlife Center in Corvallis.

This year, we were able to upgrade our X-ray system and donate our previous radiology unit to Chintimini, increasing their capacity to diagnose and treat wildlife from across the Willamette Valley. We are deeply grateful to Janet Mitchell and Jerry Cromwell, who made both our radiology upgrade and this gift to Chintimini possible.

# A Community Resource

Making a busy year even busier, in 2025, we received a staggering 4,000 calls to our Wildlife Hotline. Providing concerned community members with the information they need to assist distressed wildlife, these phone calls allow us to rescue, re-nest, and rehabilitate as many birds as possible. If you ever encounter injured, sick, or orphaned wildlife, regardless of species, please call our wildlife hotline at 541-485-1320 ext. 2. Our hotline is open from 8 AM to 6 PM, seven davs a week!

Cascades Raptor Center made major upgrades to our hospital equipment this year. Thanks to their hard work and the generosity of our donors, we were able to:

- Install a new digital radiograph machine and an oxygen concentrator
- · Construct an isolation building for birds with contagious diseases
- Remodel and repair our outdoor recovery aviaries

These improvements have elevated the quality of care and significantly increased our efficiency, helping us keep pace with a record number of intakes.



# HOSPITAL SPOTLIGHT

# THREE CASE STUDIES



### **EXTENDED STAY (RTHA 24-541)**

hough this Red-tailed Hawk was admitted in November 2024, she was one of our favorite patients of 2025, since her care took a grand total of eight months!

When she arrived at our hospital, she was weak, emaciated, infested with parasites, and suffering from a badly broken beak.

We concluded that she had likely sustained a traumatic impact, possibly a vehicle collision, that resulted in a fractured beak. The damage left her unable to groom herself effectively, allowing the parasites to multiply until the discomfort prevented her from hunting successfully.

Hospital staff began treating her parasites, which brought immediate results. However, she continued to show signs of anemia, and our team realized a blood transfusion would be necessary for further recovery. Luckily, CRC ambassador Eowyn was a suitable match!

After a successful procedure, the patient began eating on her own and was moved to a flight aviary to start

regrowing the keratin in her beak. This was a long, slow process that spanned many months. After eight months of care and numerous assessments, we determined that she had healed enough to be successfully released. She was released on July 17, 2025, weighing nearly 75% more than when she arrived!



### **UNEXPECTED VISITOR (COPO 25-242)**

t seemed like a relatively normal call to our wildlife hotline:

"Help, I think I've found a tiny owl that can't stand up!"

The caller's description led us to believe that we'd be rescuing a Western Screech-Owl, so imagine our surprise when we arrived and discovered that it wasn't an owl at all, but a Common Poorwill! This species is a member of the nightjar family, a group of nocturnal birds that includes whip-poor-wills and nighthawks. The Common Poorwill is an especially fascinating bird as it undergoes a form of hibernation, the only bird species known to do so.

Common Poorwill are rarely seen west of the Cascades, and unfortunately, as often happens with birds that stray this far from their usual range, this bird was too severely weakened and did not successfully make it to release. However, she contributed to the scientific understanding of her species simply by being found.

As our hospital receives a variety of patients from a wide geographic area, we occasionally encounter birds that are uncommon in our region. Examples in the last five years include this Common Poorwill (only the third time this species has ever been recorded in the Eugene area), a Short-tailed Shearwater that we treated in 2023 (the first-ever inland record of any shearwater in the Pacific Northwest), and a Flammulated Owl in 2021 (the first-ever record for this species west of the Cascades in Oregon).

To help researchers better understand patterns of migration and vagrancy in these species, Cascades Raptor Center created a profile on the citizen science platform eBird so we can contribute our patient data to a vast, ever-growing ornithological database.

And you can too! eBird is a free-to-use citizen science platform where your observations—even in your own backyard—can help us understand and protect Oregon's wild birds.

## **MAJESTIC RECOVERY (BAEA 25-264)**

his Bald Eagle, one of our favorite success stories of 2025, came to us from Umpqua Wildlife Rescue after being shot by a farmer. Radiographs revealed numerous lead bullet fragments in his wing, along with a fractured ulna and shattered metacarpals. Thankfully, the wound was relatively fresh, and the fractures were far enough from the joints that he had a good chance for recovery, although it took multiple surgeries to remove some of the larger metal fragments.

After three weeks in our ICU and an additional three weeks in a recently refurbished aviary, his bandage and splint were removed, but there was still a long way to go before he would be ready for release.

Occasionally, when a severe traumatic injury affects a bird's wing, it can cause feather loss outside of the normal molting cycle. In this patient's case, he lost nearly every single flight feather between the wound and the tip of his wing, necessitating a lengthy stay in our convalescent aviary. Once his feathers were fully regrown, however, we were able to move him to our large eagle flight aviary, giving him enough space to regain the strength that he would need for life in the wild.

On August 30, 2025, he was successfully released by the Oregon State Police wildlife officer in charge of his case.

# **NEW AMBASSADORS**

eil, the Harris's Hawk, also known as a Bay-winged Hawk, was hatched in 2019 in a falconry breeding program and acquired as a nestling by a permitted falconer in the Portland, Oregon area. For a number of years, he worked professionally in abatement – a form of non-lethal pest control in which a trained bird of prey is employed to deter the presence of pest species. Neil would travel to locations like airports, vineyards, and even downtown Portland to be flown at the site repeatedly. discouraging species like crows from gathering there. In 2025, Neil's falconer retired from working with birds and Neil joined the team at Cascades Raptor Center. His striking plumage and outgoing personality make him one of the more memorable ambassadors at the center. Neil believes in our mission of getting visitors up close and personal with birds of prey and his advanced flying skills have made him an invaluable member of our free flight team, often choosing to fly directly between visitors, rather than over their heads.

atched in Buffalo, New York, in a conservation breeding program on June 12th, Echo the Snowy Owl began her journey to Cascades Raptor Center with a fourday cross-country road trip. When she finally arrived, she immediately won us over with her humongous, feathered feet and goofy attitude. As we do with all new babies who join our ambassador team, Echo was quickly introduced to everything: visitors, crates, gloves, and our flight arena. She spent many supervised hours exploring and playing, pouncing on pinecones, getting sprinkle showers on hot days, and bug watching.

Echo has grown into a powerful flyer, has excellent recall into her crate, and isn't fazed by large crowds. And while she is still figuring out her brakes (flying down is hard!), we are excited to start bringing her out soon and training her to be a part of our Flight Show for the 2026 Season.

tlas, the Northern Hawk Owl, was hatched in a conservation breeding program in Spokane, Washington on June 23rd. Though she still had that silly curiosity shared by all baby raptors, she figured things out quickly and had mastered the basics like jumping to a hand, hopping to a scale, and voluntarily getting into her crate within her first week. Trainers were kept on their toes when baby Atlas discovered a love of heightsdespite the fact she hadn't yet learned how to fly down.

With her unique and very recognizable call, Atlas has quickly become a visitor favorite. You can frequently find her hunting leaves in her aviary, which she then shreds into hundreds of tiny pieces.

This owl has lots of skills, and our training team is looking forward to the challenge of training her to be a part of our 2026 Flight Show Season.







# Why Conservation Bred?



One of the frequent questions from visitors to Cascades Raptor Center is "Where did this bird come from?" As Cascades continues to evolve our practices of training and welfare to higher standards, we have moved toward acquiring birds who come from conservation breeding programs, meaning their whole life has been in human care. When birds are hatched in human care. training begins on day one. They're sensitively introduced to the things they'll encounter as ambassadors, such as sharing close quarters with humans, seeing strollers, umbrellas, and the assorted sights and

sounds of our busy nature center. This builds comfortable, confident, and healthy individuals who don't hesitate to meet visitors at Cascades in upclose personal encounters.

Birds with that level of comfort are often the most confident. Alternatively, birds who have healed from injuries experience changes in how their bodies function over time, which often leads to decreased ability to navigate spaces, increased stress, and even pain. These factors impact a bird's confidence and quality of life. We strive for the highest quality of life for our ambassadors, which means acquiring birds that are physically healthy and raised by professionals from a young age.

Some of the first feathered faces you'll meet on your next visit will be ambassadors hatched in human care. Whether it's Max the Peregrine Falcon out on a trainer's glove, or Hans the Eurasian Eagle Owl flying mere inches over your head in our seasonal flight shows, you'll have a little more understanding of how these amazing ambassadors can do this work with such skill and confidence.

# FLIGHTS OF FANCY



hat do you get when you combine five birds of prey, four expert trainers, 175 excited guests, a picturesque winery, 35 years of history, and a whole lot of delicious cheese?

Our second annual Flights of Fancy fundraiser.

There is no handbook for hosting a gala where live raptors mingle with guests, so it took plenty of planning to create a night that was both safe and unforgettable for everyone involved.

The first step was assembling our cast.

With our full troupe of ambassador birds to choose from, our trainers set out to select just the right group for the occasion. After careful discussion, they chose Valentino,

Taka, and Hoku, who are wonderful at greeting guests on the glove, along with Guillermo and Neil, two experienced flyers who never fail to captivate a crowd.

Next step: rehearse, rehearse!

In the weeks leading up to the event, our trainers held on-site and off-site practice sessions to help the birds feel confident and comfortable. Even the car ride to the winery took dedicated practice to make sure it went smoothly. For our flying birds, the venue was an entirely new place to navigate. Neil, who has spent years flying around downtown Portland, took it in stride, while Guillermo, performing off-site for the first time, quickly mastered the new setting.

While the trainers and birds rehearsed, our development team worked behind the scenes to prepare the venue, coordinate with donors and business partners, organize activities, and arrange catering.

On September 26, the 35th anniversary of CRC's incorporation, all that preparation came together.

The event took place at Sweet Cheeks Winery, whose beautiful setting made the perfect backdrop for the evening. Guests heard heartfelt stories from our founder, Louise Shimmel, along with updates from Executive Director Julie Collins. They chatted with our rehabilitation staff about the record-breaking year in the Wildlife Hospital, bid on auction items including exclusive raptor experiences and



getaways, tried their luck in the wine pull, and purchased ornaments from the giving tree. All of this unfolded while guests enjoyed Sweet Cheeks wine and an incredible grazing board prepared by Jincy's Cheese.

The evening opened with an impressive flight demonstration by Guillermo and Neil, showcasing the results of weeks of rehearsal. Throughout the night, our trainers brought ambassador birds out to meet guests, and charm the crowd, adding a sense of wonder to the event.

By the end of the evening, we raised more than \$70,000 in support of wildlife and Oregon's native raptors.

# **CREATIVE WILDLIFE CONNECTIONS**

ascades Raptor Center's Youth Raptor Art Challenge encourages students in grades K - 12 to explore Oregon's native birds of prey through artistic expression. The program helps deepen knowledge of local raptors and their ecosystems, supports the importance of wildlife conservation, and fosters connections through stewardship and creativity.

In 2025, over 600 youth submitted artwork highlighting the American Kestrel and Barn Owl species. Many pieces were submitted from participating Oregon classrooms who received free raptor resources and in-school visits. With the jurying help from the University of Oregon's Students of Eugene Bird Society group, a selection of 330 raptor portraits went on display at the Center, and an additional exhibition showcased artwork at Springfield City Hall in May. We are honored to celebrate the creativity of the community with students, teachers, and families, and showcase artwork to Cascades Raptor Center visitors.




n 1990, Louise Shimmel founded what is today the Cascades Raptor Center. As an offshoot of what was Willamette

Wildlife Rescue and Rehabilitation of Eugene, she envisioned a facility that could focus on the specialized medical needs of these avian predators while also emphasizing the value of educating members of our community on what they can do to conserve these important members of our ecosystem. Louise believed that making connections between humans and raptors could create a safer environment for all who inhabit it. Housed first in a duplex in South Eugene, medical equipment was simple, and patient recovery aviaries were built of recycled materials. Several years later, the property on Fox Hollow Rd became the home of
